
The NYCRM puts the "real" in real estate! Each person who comes to us for a meal and a bed - or for something more lasting - has a real story to share and real goals to accomplish.

Isaac had one of the best views in the city...a view many people would pay top dollar for. From his bed on the roof, he looked out on hundreds of brightly lit windows, neon signs and the rush of late-night traffic on the streets below.

He never applied for a mortgage or signed a lease, but Isaac paid dearly for that rooftop property. Now homeless, the former honor roll student had sacrificed a promising future when he began using drugs in high school.

Isaac's addiction started with a little marijuana and alcohol. Soon, he was cutting school and eventually dropped out. "Then I was introduced to selling drugs and making easy money," he recalls. "I got stuck in that lifestyle for more than ten years."

All The Doors Closed ...

That lifestyle became very destructive. "All the money I was making was going to my drugs of choice. After a while my addiction got more expensive. Even with the money I was making selling drugs, it couldn't support that addiction. So I went to stealing and robbing people; it got bad and my mother kicked me out of the house."

Staying with friends was no solution. Isaac would steal from them, too. "I came to a point where I had nowhere to stay. All the doors closed, so I was homeless." That's when Isaac found his new home on the roof of an abandoned building.

After a couple of months, Isaac realized that he needed a change. "It was really hard for me. I never thought I'd be homeless. I'm smart and I was letting my potential go down the drain."

...The Best Thing That Ever Happened To Me

When Isaac made his way to the NYCRM, he says, "It was the best thing that ever happened to me. The way I'm thinking is different now. I've got a four-year-old daughter. I can't keep selling drugs."

While working through the program, Isaac completed his GED and worked towards his CDL license. Best of all, he committed to staying drug-free. "It's been a journey but I'm happy where I'm at now. The Mission has changed my life and rebuilt the bridges I had burned. My mother calls me every day to see how I am. My friends are happy that I'm in a better place."

That "better place" may not have a rooftop view, but Isaac can stand on top of the world and know a bright future is ahead of him!

HOW WE HELP

The Mission provides a full schedule of programs and services designed to instill hope and create a foundation to rebuild lives.

Recovery Program

This 9-to-12 month interdisciplinary inpatient program empowers men to overcome substance abuse and other life-controlling and debilitating issues. The goal is simple but challenging: "rebuilding lives, transforming souls."

Career & Learning Center (CLC)

An essential part of the Recovery Program, the Career & Learning Center (CLC) offers men the chance to advance their educational and career goals, including assistance in TASC (formerly GED) preparation.

Emergency Shelter

Before resting comfortably in bed for the night, each guest is offered dinner, a hot shower, clean linens, a safe environment and the opportunity to participate in a gospel chapel service. At full capacity, we sleep approximately 160 men and 30 women on three separate floors.

Soup Kitchen and Food Pantry

Professional chefs, assisted by work therapy clients and volunteers, provide an average of 400 hot, nutritious meals every day for those who come to the Mission. We also provide staple food three times a week to families struggling to make ends meet.

Clothing Closet

We collect, organize and give away various items of men's and women's clothing to our guests, referrals and anyone in need. If you would like to donate items in new or good condition, email us at donategoods@nycrescue.org.

Medical Clinic and Social Services

Our weekly medical clinic provides basic care to our guests and residents. Additionally, three times a week, social workers and case managers connect qualified individuals with medical insurance, disease screening and other entitlements to help them overcome hunger and homelessness.
